THE COMMUNITIES OF THE ELK VALLEY

In the heart of the majestic Canadian Rocky Mountains, the Elk Valley is a hidden oasis of verdant landscapes, charming towns and abundant recreation. For over 100 years, pioneers have travelled to the region, first in search of valuable minerals, and now seeking a sanctuary focused on family, community and the beautiful outdoors. Mining still forms the base of a thriving economy that has now diversified and welcomes a variety of artisans, small businesses, and an active year-round recreational and cultural tourism industry.

FERNIE is the largest and oldest of the three main communities in the Elk Valley. A town rich in heritage, award-winning architecture, and spectacular scenery, Fernie charms and delights all ages. Whether strolling century-old Historic Downtown, exploring the unique geography, visiting artists and artisans or revelling in the packed cultural calendar, there's something for everyone to enjoy.

Pop: 6,320 | Founded 1898 | Incorporated 1904

SPARWOOD lies in the middle of the valley and is the first community reached on entering from Alberta. The town's name is derived from the local trees that were used for manufacturing spars for ocean vessels. The town was founded as a new home for the residents of the temporary communities of Michel and Natal. Several art murals can be seen here, depicting the strong connection to coal mining, with some by Michelle Loughery who was born in the area and went on to become a world-renowned muralist.


Pop: 4,184 | Founded 1966

At the head of the valley is **ELKFORD**, a small town with a passionate arts community. Writing, painting, photography, and pottery are among the popular endeavours, and well-known glass artist Katherine Russell has a working studio here. Elkford is the gateway to the Elk Lakes Provincial Park, a remote protected area bordering Alberta's Kananaskis Country.

Channelling the grit and energy of the mountains of the Elk Valley, Mt Rushka is a band with a rock-solid future.

Guitarist, Will Ripley, and twin sister & bassist, Alanna Laurin, are the children of Fernie's first ever Griz. Will is a professional international guitar teacher and Alanna co-founded Society Jane, a hair salon in Fernie. Alanna is married to powerhouse lead singer, Adam Laurin, who moved to Fernie from Calgary nearly 20 years ago and founded snowboard and skateboard shop, Commit. Drummer Aaron Wrench twists wrenches at the coal mine as a heavy-duty mechanic and reconnected with Will after a 15-year hiatus after the two studied together at the Berklee College of Music's affiliate program in Nelson.

The band's name is a deliberate alliteration of Mount Rushmore in the US and a nod to the forefathers of rock music - one being Alex Lifeson of Rush, who was born in Fernie. The name also references the local mountains that form the name of the street where Will, Alanna, and Adam live, and the surname name of a neighbour.

Mount Rushka have performed sold-out shows in Fernie and toured throughout BC & Alberta with more dates planned for spring and summer 2024. The band's members have touring credits with The Tea Party, One Bad Son, Rev Theory, Papa Roach, and Shinedown. They launched their first single 'Moonlight' in October 2022. 'Hold On,' their third release, received over 10,000 views in the first month. They are now working on a full-length album at Calgary's OCL studios with Brian Moncarz, a Canadian producer who has worked with Alice Cooper, Our Lady Peace, and The Trews. The album is due out in spring 2024 - support the launch on Kickstarter through the Mount Rushka website. Check out Mount Ruska's #downrightrock this winter!

FERNIE PRIDE SOCIETY

In 2016, two events were the catalyst for the formation of the Fernie Pride Society when a local couple hosted a community QBQ (queer BBQ) and the mother of a Trans teen reached out to a queer historian for help in setting up a local Pride organization. The following year, the society hosted the first Elk Valley Pride Festival, an event that continues to be a popular feature each September on the lawns at City Hall.

Over the past seven years, the society has continued to grow, advocating for the local 2SLGBTQ+ community, hosting visiting artists, and offering a variety of inclusive and accessible events to celebrate pride. Throughout the winter, watch for 'Rainbow Connections' social



events and gay ski days, and be ready to cheer and wave your rainbow flags for the Pride float in the Griz Days parade!



ELKFORD ARTS STUDIO GET CREATIVE BY NATURE





The Elkford Arts Studio has been proudly promoting arts and culture in the community since 2014. The studio operates through the Elkford Arts Council Society, a registered non-profit, and is run entirely by volunteers. Its mission is to provide the Elk Valley with a range of classes and workshops – suitable for artists of all ages and abilities – including painting, pottery, drawing, glass mosaic, wood burning, wool, charcoal, crochet, felting and more.

ABOUT THE STUDIO

Located on the second floor of the Elkford Recreation Centre, the Elkford Arts Studio is a bright, welcoming, inclusive, and wheelchair-accessible place for users to create and connect. The space hosts year-round classes and workshops with local artists, and it features a full-service pottery studio and ample art supplies for many mediums. Register for upcoming classes and events at elkfordarts.ca.

Drop by the studio on the last Monday of each month from 6:30 to 9pm, for Meditative Mondays. This free, dropin program for adults and youth (ages 16+) aims to promote mental health and artistic expression. Join in a guided activity or just enjoy the company of others - no membership or artistic experience required.

JOIN THE ELKFORD ARTS STUDIO

Annual memberships are available through the website and cost \$50 for adults and \$35 for youth/seniors. Members receive discounts on most regular programming and direct access to using the studio (a discounted daily dropin fee applies), and membership fees go directly to supporting the ongoing operations of the studio and EACS.

ARTS & CULTURAL HUB THE ARTS STATION

A vibrant and engaging space for the creative community in Fernie featuring all disciplines of the arts for visitors and locals alike. The Arts Station has a varied program of entertainment and activities throughout the year including live concerts, film screenings, pottery workshops, community theatre, gallery shows, and creative classes for all ages.

LIVING HISTORY IN A HERITAGE BUILDING

From 1898 to 1964, the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR) station was the economic and social hub of the community. The current station building was completed in the spring of 1909 after an earlier incarnation burned down in the Great Fire of 1908. The CPR donated the disused building to the City of Fernie and in 1987 the Fernie Arts Council began the four-year process of moving the building onto a new foundation and completely renovating the dilapidated structure. The former waiting room became the foyer gallery and every other space found new life as studios, event space, and even a restaurant. The Arts Station opened in 1990 as an indispensable base for artists in the Elk Valley.

The Arts Station has been a hub for local artists to gather and share all forms of artistic expression for 30 years and is home to many guilds. The Arts Station



produces the Fernie Banner Project and Dumpster Project each year. Outside, discover 'A Hardy Town' - a sculpture by local artist Michael Hepher and Kootenay metalworker Paul Reimer, commemorating the 1908 Great Fire. Next to the sculpture is 'Grow With The Flow' by Tara Higgins and Becca Davies, celebrating Fernie's active lifestyle and love of music.

THIS WINTER AT THE ARTS STATION

The Arts Station offers a packed program of entertainment, exhibits, workshops and presentations throughout the year. See calendars for details of activities, drop-in sessions and visiting musicians.

Monthly events include Life Drawing, an opportunity to study the human form with a nude model. Cleansing Art Sessions are an expressive art experience led by the Elk Valley Suicide Task Force. Laugh, connect and let your imagination guide you in mark making. Not a therapy session, these gatherings focus on building connections and offering a welcoming space. Registration is required as spaces are limited. Each month features a theme, see calendar for details. Weekend Workshops explore a range of subjects including textiles, surface design and more.

Regular screenings of popular operas continue in 2024 on the first Friday of each month, beginning with Puccini's Tosca on January 5. Admission by donation.

The Pottery Studio is a hub of activity at the station. Activities include skill building workshops, Wine & Wheel social evenings, Meet the Wheel introductory sessions, Sculpture workshops, multi-day intensives and exhibits.

Over 100 books have been written about the Elk Valley, or by local authors.

From the days of the earliest settlers and trappers, this corner of the Canadian Rocky Mountains has captivated and inspired visitors to write about their travels. 'Camp Fires in the Canadian Rockies,' first published in 1906, is a delightful tome that tells of the hunting tours of New York Zoological Park Director, William T. Hornaday who writes; "...in the valley of the Elk River we found so much of interest it is impossible to ignore this gateway to our garden of the gods.'

Historical texts and photo journals have recorded Fernie's history over the years. Some, like Sandra Semchuk's 'The Stories Were Not Told,' about Canada's First World War internment camps or Clara Graham's 'This Was the Kootenay,' about the relationships between settlers and indigenous people, maintain a factual and heartfelt tone, while others are more irreverent. Sydney Hutcheson, a political activist and sharp storyteller, offers an insight into the lives of the folk on

whose back Fernie was built in his books: Depression Stories, The Curse, and The Well'a Board.

Today, the spirit of storytelling continues. Local historian Gordon Sombrowski has published two books on life in Fernie through the 20th century, weaving together his own recollections, historical details, and creative license. The tales begin with 'What Echo Heard' and continue with 'What Narcissus Saw.' Writer and teacher, Angie Abdou, has published four novels, two memoirs, a book of short stories, and several books of essays and conversations. Her character-driven work reflects life's challenges in at-times poignant and often confronting style.

For a taste of the writer's life, drop by Bramasole for a Writer's Gathering every second Monday, and watch for Booked! events at the Fernie Heritage Library. Browse the collections of local books at the Library, Polar Peek Books & Treasures, and Fernie Museum Gift Shop. Dannika Spady is originally from Calgary. She named her pottery company after scenic Dipper Lake near Kimberley, where she lived prior to moving to Sparwood recently with husband, David.

As a young artist, Spady began her journey in ceramics in Cochrane in grade 8, later going on to assist and teach at the same studio from 2012 and selling at Christmas markets in Cochrane. She completed a history degree but always kept her pottery wheel with her and took a ceramics course where she developed her classic potheads series. These early works have evolved into highly decorative functional vessels featuring delicate floral accents.

In Sparwood, the artist has found a home at Moonlight Flowers, where she offers small pottery classes in hand building and wheel throwing. With her own kiln on-site, she finishes each piece in house and works on her own retail line which is available at the store. Her pieces are also available in Kimberley and online to an international market.

Spady's work focuses on organic forms and whimsical presentations, using plaster molds and a variety of pressing



techniques to create realistic floral arrangements. She has developed a line of small mushrooms and vulva mugs, which have become popular gifts and souvenirs. In the summer the artist also manages the Sparwood Friday evening Markets and is currently studying for a second degree in teaching.

As a former city kid, Spady was pleasantly surprised at how easily she fell in love with the mountains and with snowboarding, which she has taken to as a new passion after only a few daytrips as a child. She lives in Sparwood with her husband and their cat, Margo, and Great Dane called Mouse.

A love of cooking took Executive Chef Victor Spicer from his hometown of Calgary around the world. Along with stops in the culinary hotspots of Japan, Thailand, and France, he spent 2 years working his way across Australia, gathering experience in a variety of locations from backcountry horseback camps to 3 hat restaurants and building on his qualification as a Red Seal Chef and three-year culinary graduate from SAIT.

In Australia Spicer took up snowboarding, which led him to Fernie on his return to Canada. At Fernie Alpine Resort he took up the position of Executive Chef at Cirque Restaurant at Lizard Creek Lodge. He also developed and manages the resort's catering department which operates large events throughout the year including weddings, receptions, and special dinners at several locations on the mountain. The connection that food brings with small groups around a shared table and a passion for local produce led Spicer to start Elk Valley Catering with his wife, Karlea. They offer private dinners and special events at vacation homes in Fernie including Fernie Mountain House and The Matterhorn.

Beginning in January, Elk Valley Catering will begin a new collaboration



with Elk View Lodge called Peaks and Plates, a monthly series of dinners featuring a three-course menu carefully crafted from the best local ingredients and paired with fine BC wines. The evening will begin with a welcome drink and small bites, and live music featuring local musicians including Fernie's own Naena Robinson and Kootenay string quartet, Three Strings to the Wind. Designed for a maximum of 25 guests, the meal will be served long table style for an engaging evening of conversation and culinary delights. Multimedia artist Jolene Miner has felt embraced and encouraged by the local Arts community since moving to Fernie in 2019. She earned her BFA from the University of Saskatchewan in 2000 and now finds inspiration in the diverse landscapes and dramatic colour changes that we enjoy in the Elk Valley all year round. Miner began her art practice with painting and drawing, but always felt drawn to collage. A sense of wonder that she has held from childhood led her to the expressive nature of paper and found objects, embracing an artistic technique known as 'touch of the hand' where evidence of the artist's individuality and expression are welcome.

Through the use of juicy colours, simple lines, and layering, she builds engaging landscapes that capture her spirit of creativity. Always eager to learn and evolve, she has recently begun working on wood bases and adding jewel-like wax finishes. Her style is intuitive, laying down individual pieces until the picture emerges, only gluing the work down in the final stages. For a more structured approach, she turns to bookbinding. This ancient artform necessarily has more parameters but by adding embellishments and unique stitching, a variety of effects can be achieved.



The artist has led workshops at The Arts Station in Fernie and has work on display and for sale at the Fernie Arts Co-op and at Art Gallery Kimberley, where she will be featured in the Art Market until December 24. Opening February 29 at The Arts Station, Appleskins is a collection of new paintings. The artist followed a spontaneous approach with no limitations or objectives, allowing the pieces to emerge through repeating shapes, figurative references, and the occasional use of mixed media. See the show in the gallery through March. Jolene Miner lives in Fernie with husband, Jared, and their two Australian Labradoodles, Jake and Mabel, who are her favourite studio companions.

The Ktunaxa (pronounced "k-too-nah-ha") people have occupied the lands around the Kootenay and Columbia Rivers for thousands of years.

The Ktunaxa enjoyed the natural bounty of the Kootenay region (Ktunaxa ?amakis), seasonally migrating throughout their homelands hunting and gathering, and using the prairie extensively in the summer to graze large herds.

The Elk Valley area was the primary home of the easternmost branch of the Ktunaxa people, and includes the area now known as Tobacco Plains to the southwest of Fernie. The Michel Prairie people used the area near Sparwood to plant tobacco. Their Ktunaxa name is 'k?aqawakanmituqnik' and means "river running into and out again" (the Michel Creek into the Elk River).

The Ktunaxa origin story speaks of a time, before the people, when animals populated the world. At that time there was a disturbance caused by a huge water monster known as Yawu?nik, who killed many of the animals. It was decided by the animals that Yawu?nik had to be destroyed. A war party was formed by the chief animal, Na†muq¢in. Yawu?nik was quick to descend on the Kootenay (wu·u ?aqs†maknik ?akinmituk) and Columbia (Mi¢qaqas) river system and the other animals gave chase.

Eventually Yawu?nik was caught, killed, butchered and distributed among the animals. Yawu?nik's ribs were scattered throughout the region that now form the Hoodoos seen throughout the region.

In all the excitement Na†muq¢in rose to his feet and stood upright hitting his head on the ceiling of the sky. He knocked himself dead. His body forms the Rocky Mountains. When the prophecy was fulfilled the spirit animals ascended above and are now the guiding spirits of the Ktunaxa. The Ktunaxa people have been in this area since Na‡muq¢in fulfilled his prophecy and placed the Ktunaxa people in this area to be the keepers of the land.

THE HISTORY OF FERNIE'S HOSPITAL

Fernie was booming at the turn of the last century. The active mining, logging, and construction trades along with the everyday challenges of mountain life made adequate healthcare a high priority. Dr. S. Corsan saw this need and replaced the insufficient hospital on Baker (1st) Ave with a new one on Victoria (2nd) Avenue, along with a home for nurses on his property. Soon afterwards, he joined forces with Dr. Bonnell to build a new hospital on McEvoy (8th) Street at Pellatt (3rd) Avenue, which burned down in the Great Fire of 1908.

The doctors immediately rebuilt the hospital with 25 beds at a cost of \$20,000, opening in 1909, along with a new home for single nurses across the street. Miners paid \$1 per month in an early form of healthcare premiums. In 1924, this hospital was forced to close due to financial difficulty. Services were temporarily provided at the Nurses' Home, but the community quickly came together to formulate a plan to re-open the Hospital in 1925. Following the Second World War, plans were put in place for a new hospital, to be Fernie's war memorial. The 43-bed Fernie Memorial Hospital opened on

Remembrance Day, November 11, 1949, on Dalton (6th) Avenue on the site of the current Park Place Lodge.

By the 1960s, capacity was once again at a maximum due to industrial expansion at



the nearby mines and the community needed a large, modern hospital to accommodate projected population growth. Plans were slow to come to fruition, with the Minister of Health finally giving approval in principle for a 60-bed facility in 1967, and the Elk Valley Hospital formally opening on June 22, 1974. All of the former hospitals have been demolished and replaced with new structures, but the Old Nurse's Residence still stands and is now available for short term rentals.



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Our story began 140 million years ago

NEW TECK DISCOVERY ROOM NOW OPEN!

140 million years ago, long necked herbivorous dinosaurs walked along the shores of an ancient lake in what is now the southeast region of British Columbia. Following this herd of gentle giants, was a pack of large predatory dinosaurs. Like lions following wildebeest across the plains, the dinosaurs waited for an opportunity to feed on the weak, old and injured in the herd.

Fast forward to today and this lakeshore is now a mountaintop region near Sparwood known as Line Creek.
Amazingly, the ancient tracks from this drama were perfectly preserved and were recently uncovered during exploratory activities. Follow the trail for yourself in the Sparwood Museum's fascinating new permanent Jurassic Exhibit.



The Natal Sparwood Heritage Society is dedicated to preserving and sharing the histories of Sparwood, Corbin, Michel, Middletown and Natal. The geology of the Elk Valley has provided a rich income for settlers for over 120 years. Local mining activity is now centred around Sparwood and the Sparwood Museum tells the story of how this industry has evolved and shaped the community.



SPARWOOD MURAL AND MINE ARTIFACTS WALKING TOUR

The story of coal mining in Sparwood spans over a century, from the first underground mines at nearby Michel in 1899 to some of the most productive open pit mines in the world. In the 1960s, the original town sites of Michel and Natal were relocated to Sparwood. Over the years, coal extraction methods have evolved from picks and ponies to the massive electric shovels and 240-ton haul trucks of modern surface mining. The objects along the walking tour bear witness to the evolution of Elk Valley coal mining from the early 1940s through to the 1980s.

Start this easy self-guided walking tour from the Sparwood Visitor Centre. Tour walking time approximately 60 minutes.



#4 CROW'S NEST HOTEL & THE MINER'S HALL

The 'workingman's' hotel first opened on this site in 1901. The current building replaced it in 1909 after the great fire, as The Central Hotel. The Vogue Theatre was previously the Miner's Hall, built in 1909 on a vacant lot purchased in 1904. Later renamed as The Grand, it became the Vogue Theatre in 1947.



#5 KNOX UNITED CHURCH

A wooden church was built on this site in 1898 and replaced with this church in 1910, following the great fire. The Methodist and Presbyterian congregations worshipped together and supported the formation of the United Church of Canada. Following a short period of shared ministry with Christ Church Anglican, the building was sold to the Fernie Heritage Trust Society in 2022. The property is now in use as a performing arts venue and the society is actively working to renovate the interior space and improve access.



#6 UKRAINIAN INTERNMENT MEMORIAL

During Canada's first national internment operations of 1914-1920, thousands of Ukrainians and other Europeans were imprisoned as 'enemy aliens.' The Fernie Internment camp was initially set up near this site in the ice rink and later moved to a vacant hotel in Morrissey. This memorial stone was installed in 2005.



#13 THE NURSE'S HOME AND FERNIE HOSPITAL

Doctors Corsan and Bonnell built a hospital here shortly before the great fire of 1908. After if burned down, they replaced it with a new 25-bed hospital on the same location. The hospital was later moved to 6th Avenue, and then 5th avenue, and this site was redeveloped for residential housing. The Nurse's Home was located across the street; the property still stands today and became a B&B in 1993. See feature, P25.
