THE COMMUNITIES OF THE ELK VALLEY

In the heart of the majestic Canadian Rocky Mountains, the Elk Valley is a hidden oasis of verdant landscapes, charming towns and abundant recreation. For over 100 years, pioneers have travelled to the region, first in search of valuable minerals, and now seeking a sanctuary focused on family, community and the beautiful outdoors. Mining still forms the base of a thriving economy that has now diversified and welcomes a variety of artisans, small businesses, and an active year-round recreational and cultural tourism industry.

FERNIE is the largest and oldest of the three main communities in the Elk Valley. A town rich in heritage, award-winning architecture, and spectacular scenery, Fernie charms and delights all ages. Whether strolling centuryold Historic Downtown, exploring the unique geography, visiting artists and artisans or revelling in the packed cultural calendar, there's something for everyone to enjoy.

Pop: 6,320 | Founded 1898 | Incorporated 1904

SPARWOOD lies in the middle of the valley and is the first community reached on entering from Alberta. The town's name is derived from the local trees that were used for manufacturing spars for ocean vessels. The town was founded as a new home for the residents of the temporary communities of Michel and Natal. Several art murals can be seen here, depicting the strong connection to coal mining, with some by Michelle Loughery who was born in the area and went on to become a world-renowned muralist.

Pop: 4,184 | Founded 1966

At the head of the valley is **ELKFORD**, a small town with a passionate arts community. Writing, painting, photography, and pottery are among the popular endeavours, and well-known glass artist Katherine Russell has a working studio here. Elkford is the gateway to the Elk Lakes Provincial Park, a remote protected area bordering Alberta's Kananaskis Country.



KTUNAXA FEATURE THE PAKANUXUNIK' -YAQIT PA·KNUQHI'IT FIRST NATION

The ?akanuxunik' members of Yaqit ?aknuq‡i'it First Nation (In English, "Tobacco Plains Indian Band") are the distinct group of Indigenous people who have occupied, controlled and been exclusive stewards over their unceded ancestral lands since time immemorial. These lands comprise 10,600 acres in Southeastern British Columbia. The Southern boundary adjoins the USA border in Montana. Highway 93 crosses the Reserve at two locations and the Reserve surrounds the Canada Customs facility.

?akanuxunik' people - the people that are from where the water comes out of the mountain - are one of the seven Bands of the Ktunaxa (Kootenai) speaking peoples of British Columbia, Idaho and Montana. The Chief of Tobacco Plains Indian Band is Heidi Gravelle. Outspoken, compassionate, and committed to preserving the future of her people, in 2019 she followed in the footsteps of her grandmother, Elizabeth Gravelle – the first female First Nations Chief to be elected in Canada – and became Chief herself. She was re-elected in 2023.

Yaqit ?a·knuqti'it is currently reclaiming their self-determination and sustainability, while preserving and nurturing ?akanuxunik' land, culture, language, and ceremony. Their vision is guided by their ancestors and creator with strength and unity, ensuring that all ?akanuxunik' are acknowledged and respected. Gravelle says that the survival of her people and their culture is contingent on the health and protection of their land and natural resources. "We hold a covenant with the Creator to be the caretakers and stewards of Ya'qit ?a·knuqti'it lands," says Nasu?kin (Chief) Heidi Gravelle of Ya'qit ?a·knuqti'it First Nation. "With that we have an obligation to restore, protect and be the voices of our lands."

The Yadit ?a·knug#i'it First Nation is actively working to protect and further the aboriginal rights and title of ?akanuxunik' memberships, providing opportunities in economic development, health and wellness, employment and training, and cultural heritage. In 2024, their efforts have centered around strengthening leadership-to-leadership relationships with key partners including the Province of British Columbia, Local Municipal Governments (Elkford, Sparwood & Fernie), and industry, such as formerly named Teck Resources Limited, BC Hydro, North Coal, and NWP.





The progress in Government to Government and Industry leadershipto-leadership relationships reflects the exciting work being done, specifically within the Reconciliation Department. These efforts can lay the groundwork for a future where Yaqit ?a·knuq‡i'it people can independently manage and protect their lands and resources.

"Our lands provide us with an ecosystem where our waters, plants and animals work together in a symbiotic relationship to sustain our people and maintain our ways of life since time immemorial," says Nasu?kin Gravelle. "Our culture is interwoven with our land and water. They thrive together, or die together," she says. "The transformative action of reconciling our land is a pathway to healing, while honouring our culture, our creator and our ancestors. We believe this is a model for future landreconciliation projects: ?akanuxunik land





stewardship directed by ?akanuxunik people."

"Council and I continue to diligently pursue our goal of building mutually beneficial relationships with industry and government. We will always stand together as a First Nation and speak up to preserve our land, but we've discovered that working from the inside is a better way to achieve success. While trust can't be built without the investment of time, we're getting there. Our desire is to ensure that the protection of our land be top-of-mind to everyone at the table when decisions are being made. It's a new way forward and we are proud to be breaking the trail. We hope all First Nations will follow. Together, we are stronger."

HERITAGE FEATURE CARRYING COAL -DIESEL LOCOMOTIVE IN THE ELK VALLE

In a notch of the brick gateway into Sparwood lies an old relic from the Michel Mines; a Ruston Diesel Locomotive, an English made coal haulage engine that was used to tow mine cars in and out of the former mines at nearby Michel. It was brought to the Elk Valley in the early 1950s and replaced the old air locomotive workhorses that served the valley mines for the first 50 years of their existence. The Ruston's were all hydraulic and came equipped with air brakes, a crank or air start and a ceramic bead noxious fume filter that had to be continually cleaned. Pasquale Camilli, a retired Ruston operator from Michel claims those machines required a lot of a maintenance and recalls an English mechanic who was brought over to teach local operators how to fix them but observed that the "...Englishman was more concerned about getting back to England than teaching us all about the Ruston's intricacies."

In Fernie a diesel locomotive that served in underground haulage can be seen outside the Visitor Information Centre. The 100-horsepower engine was made by Hudswell Clark & Co. of Leeds, England in 1948 and was known as the



Diesel locomotives replaced the earlier air locomotives which prevailed prior to the 1950's.

'outside diesel,' capable of hauling 34 3-ton coal cars at a time. It serviced the International Coke and Coal Co. mine in Coleman till 1954 and then went to work in the Cheakamus Power Tunnel Project in Garibaldi, B.C. There, in 1956, it helped set a world record for most footage driven in 24 hours. It returned to work at Vicary Mine in Coleman in 1959 where it ran until it was replaced by conveyors in 1975.

Diesel locomotives were noisy, smelly and temperamental but they moved millions of tons of coal from Crowsnest Pass mines in their time.



With a degree in web and graphic design under her belt where she often worked with graphite or created cartoons, Jennifer Laberge found a passion for her current medium after purchasing a wood burner in Arkansas while visiting family. She taught herself how to manipulate wood with the instrument and learned the many intricacies of different wood types - hardwood, softwoods, grain, figuring, heartwood and even the sapwood can all burn differently and can affect the outcome of the design. A cheap skateboard served as an early canvas; she later moved on to clocks and has also worked with paper and leather. She has tried over 40 different varieties and now favours maple, basswood, poplar, and cherry.

Carefully incorporating natural features like knots and using a variety of pen tips and heat controls, she freehands original designs onto the wood. Her work often features fantasy themes including gnomes and dragons, wildlife and pets, cars, and mandalas. She usually relies on the unique colours of the burned wood but sometimes includes watercolour paint or pencil accents.

Fernie's walls have become a little more colourful in recent years thanks to The Fernie & District Art Council's Fernie Mural Project. Since 2018, each of the project's official publicly funded community murals have been carefully selected by a jury guided by Fernie's public art policy and the unique character of each space. Each artwork enriches our community, inspiring pride, reflection, and drawing people in, contributing to economic growth and sustainability.

The first mural of the project can be found on the corner of 2nd Avenue and 7th Street, on the side of Beanpod Chocolate, Gelato & Coffee and was officially presented to the community on October 15, 2019. 'All Kinds of Beauty' by Michael Hepher is 96 feet long and around 15 feet tall. Designed to capture the beauty of our diverse community in a symbolic way, the bright, graphic work includes references to Fernie's dramatic landscapes, industry, nature, community, and recreational activities. Peeking around the corner towards 2nd Avenue



is a large raven, in honour of the Ktunaxa name for this area - Quk'in Amak'is, Land of the Raven.

LIVING HISTORY IN A HERITAGE BUILDING

From 1898 to 1964, the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR) station was the economic and social hub of the community. The current station building was completed in the spring of 1909 after an earlier incarnation burned down in the Great Fire of 1908. The CPR donated the disused building to the City of Fernie and in 1987 the Fernie Arts Council began the four-year process of moving the building onto a new foundation and completely renovating the dilapidated structure. The former waiting room became the foyer gallery and every other space found new life as studios, event space, and even a restaurant. The Arts Station opened in 1990 as an indispensable base for artists in the Elk Valley.

The Arts Station has been a hub for local artists to gather and share all forms of artistic expression for 30



years and is home to many guilds. The Arts Station produces new public art regularly, including murals and the Fernie Banner Project. Outside, discover 'A Hardy Town' – a sculpture by local artist Michael Hepher and Kootenay metalworker Paul Reimer, commemorating the 1908 Great Fire. Next to the sculpture is 'Grow With the Flow' by Tara Higgins and Becca Davies. 'All Aboard' by Erich Stoffels is the newest addition across Station Square.





A decade later she sold the business to focus on raising her two daughters Eve & Noah with husband Morgan, who works in construction and is a fine art painter.

After selling the store, she took up candle making as a hobby and realized that there was a good business opportunity in hand crafted candles. She spent over 6 months testing ingredients and learning the science, which can be more intensive that one might imagine! With her love of pretty things and an eye for detail and colour, she enjoys all aspects of the product development from choosing unique containers to designing the brand identity and labels and focuses on high quality components including soy wax and cotton wicks.

Working from home and now melting wax 30 litres at a time, she has built her range over the past two years now offering 15 scents in three collections: Spa, Home, and Occasion. Each candle



features Dunnet's own hand blended scents, individually selected vessels, unique designs, and hours of detailed testing to perfect the aroma and burn quality and time. 

FEATURED AUTHOR

Originally from Sweden, Mikaela Cannon travelled and studied extensively in her quest for knowledge about plants. As a child she was fascinated with plants - she looked at plantains and saw band aids, only later discovering that the plant has strong wound-healing properties. In Sweden, she trained as a wilderness guide and lived in a tipi, studying the Sami culture and way of life. On canoe trips in the wilderness, she sought out local flora and learned how to use plants for food, medicine, and material.

From Sweden, she travelled to Australia where she developed her interest in ethnobotany. Working in an animal park she taught visitors to lick green ants for the taste of sour candy! At the park she met her (now) husband Peter, later moving with him to his home in Canada around 15 years ago and settling in Spallumcheen. She studied ethnobotany and biology in the Okanagan and explored herbal medicine and anthropology. Her deep appreciation for the land is guided by first nations and Indigenous traditional teachings and she strives to be a good guest on Turtle Island.

Her book - Foraging as a Way of Life - written over 9 years while homeschooling her two young children, is a comprehensive foraging guide



to the trees, shrubs, flowers, herbs and mushrooms that grow in British Columbia, many of which can also be found around the world. The book is carefully arranged by season, beginning in the spring as the first plants bloom into life. With a family connection to Fernie, her book is an excellent guide to local plants with extensive descriptions, medicinal information, recipes, warnings and colour photos. EVERGREENS FARM

Whether it is snowing, hailing, or blazing hot outside, at Evergreens Farm it's always a lush 21 degrees celsius and sunny. At Fernie's innovative new hydroponic farm, vibrant green leaves stretch towards the bright lights, thriving in an environment far removed from harsh extremes outside. Evergreens is a social enterprise operated by Wildsight Elk Valley, dedicated to providing fresh, locally grown, pesticide-free leafy greens year-round.

With only about 90 frost-free days annually in the Elk Valley, outdoor growing is limited, making the community heavily dependent on imported food. Evergreens was founded to increase the year-round supply of local food and strengthen the local food system. Controlled Environment Agriculture is an advanced agricultural method that grows plants indoors without soil. Instead, plants absorb nutrients directly from water and receive energy from full-spectrum LED lights. This method is incredibly efficient, using 90% less water than traditional farming. The climate-controlled environment ensures fresh, nutritious greens regardless of the weather outside, providing a reliable source of produce throughout the year.

Why does local lettuce matter? It's simple: less transportation means a smaller carbon footprint. While lettuce from California

or Mexico travels

thousands of kilometres to reach Fernie, Evergreens Farm lettuce is grown right in Fernie at the Community EcoGarden. This not only ensures fresher greens on your plate but also supports local jobs and strengthens Fernie's food system. Evergreens' commitment goes beyond growing greens. A portion of all produce is donated to the Fernie Food Bank to bring fresh greens to food-insecure community members.

For visitors and locals eager to experience the magic of Evergreens firsthand, the Farm offers weekly volunteer sessions, a behind-the-scenes tour where you'll help pack leafy greens destined for community distribution and can learn about this incredible new facility. And you'll even leave with a bundle of fresh produce to enjoy at home. A familiar face has returned to Fernie after over 15 years in Vancouver. Fans of the former The Wood restaurant will remember Head Chef Corey Sullivan for his Paysanne-inspired cuisine and love of farm to fork ingredients. When the restaurant moved to Vancouver (renamed Twisted Fork), Sullivan's love of home-made preserves was evident in many of the dishes, and jars of his creations became part of the décor lining the walls of the restaurant's two locations where production was as many as 400 jars a week.

Sullivan trained as a chef in Ontario then worked at Lizard Creek Lodge before going into business in 2000 with two Fernie locals, siblings Mike and Andrea Leslie, before they decided to move the restaurant to Vancouver. Matthew Schaafsma also made the move from Ontario first to Edmonton and then Vancouver in 2014, working in retail and sales. The pair met almost a decade ago and tied the knot in 2022, moving to Fernie in the fall of 2023 for the smalltown outdoor lifestyle that they both fondly remembered.

Schaafsma's background in sales and Sullivan's love and knowledge of preserves made their latest venture a



natural fit. Twisted Fern is a reference to the town they call home, the restaurant in Vancouver, and the unique nature of their product. While there will always be regular staples, twisted options include pineapple jam, pickled brussels sprouts, and creative relishes. Ingredients like saskatoon berries are inspired by seasonal availability and the range also features simple syrups including lavender & mint and black pepper to add a Fernie

NEW TECK DISCOVERY ROOM NOW OPEN!

140 million years ago, long necked herbivorous dinosaurs walked along the shores of an ancient lake in what is now the southeast region of British Columbia. Following this herd of gentle giants, was a pack of large predatory dinosaurs. Like lions following wildebeest across the plains, the dinosaurs waited for an opportunity to feed on the weak, old and injured in the herd. Fast forward to today and this lakeshore is now a mountaintop region near Sparwood known as Line Creek. Amazingly, the ancient tracks from this drama were perfectly preserved and were recently uncovered during exploratory activities. The Natal Sparwood Heritage Society is dedicated to preserving and sharing the histories of Sparwood, Corbin, Michel, Middletown and Natal. The geology of the Elk Valley has provided a rich income for settlers for over 120 years. Local mining activity is now centred around Sparwood; the Sparwood Museum tells the story of how this industry has evolved and shaped the community.



HERITAGE ARCHITECTURE SPARWOOD MURAL AND MINE ARTIFACTS WALKING TOUR

The story of coal mining in Sparwood spans over a century, from the first underground mines at nearby Michel in 1899 to some of the most productive open pit mines in the world. In the 1960s, the original town sites of Michel and Natal were relocated to Sparwood. Over the years, coal extraction methods have evolved from picks and ponies to the massive electric shovels and 240-ton haul trucks of modern surface mining. The objects along the walking tour bear witness to the evolution of Elk Valley coal mining from the early 1940s through to the 1980s.

Start this easy self-guided walking tour from the Sparwood Visitor Centre. Tour walking time approximately 60 minutes.

THE ELK RIVER

The Elk River is a 220km freestone tributary of the Kootenay River connecting Elk Lakes near the Continental Divide, with Lake Koocanusa and the Columbia River.

In the Elk Valley, the river is treasured as an endless source of inspiration for local artists, a world-renowned fly-fishing destination, and a favourite for family float trips, white water rafting, and adventure kayaking. Many parks are located along its banks and the paved, accessible 5.3km Fernie Valley Pathway follows its course from the Fernie Visitor Information Centre to Mt Fernie Provincial Park.
